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Mayor holds town hall in SE Queens

Mayor Bill de Blasio said a location for the long-awaited new police precinct in southeast Queens might be determined by the end of the summer, although he cautioned that it would likely be years before construction on the precinct was completed.


The news about the 116th Precinct came in the midst of a two-hour town hall held at Springfield Gardens Educational Campus June 16. The event was moderated by Councilman Donovan Richards (D-Laurelton).

The city has allocated \$70 million from this year's budget for the construction of a precinct to serve the communities of Rosedale, Brookville, Laurelton and Springfield Gardens. The area currently is covered by the 105th Precinct with a separate substation. Richards said committed community members had been fighting for the new precinct for decades.

In the aftermath of the worst gun massacre in U.S. history, the father of Omar Mateen said "it had nothing to do with religion." Mateen had gone to a gay nightclub in Orlando, murdered 49 people and injured another 53 after he saw two men kissing, Mir Seddique told NBC News.

The following day, City Councilman Jimmy Bramer (D-Sunnyside), one of seven openly gay members on the City Council, sent an e-mail to his constituents and supporters with a photo of him kissing his husband, Dan Hen-

"In the face of unspeakable hatred and violence we often feel powerless," Van Bramer wrote under the photo. "But terror is meant to stop us from being who we are, from living our lives as we want. But we can't go back or live in fear. I want to respond with more love, more pride, and yes more kisses in public!!'

The defiant response to the Queens-born gunman Mateen also served as a reminder of Van Bramer's 6th annual LGBT Pride Month

Teen arrested in Qns Village assault

A group of three teenagers assaulted a Muslim man outside of his Queens Village mosque earlier this month as a part of a "knockout game," according to a 14-year-old who was arrested and charged with the attack, police said.

The suspect, whose name was not being released due to his age, was charged with assault and a hate crime, according to the NYPD. The Queens district attorney's office said the teenage suspect would be processed through Family

Court. Police were looking for the two other suspects.

At about 10:30 p.m. June 1, Mohamed Rasheed Khan, 59, left the Center for Islamic Studies at 206-09 Jamaica Ave. and started riding his bicycle, police said. The arrested teenag-

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S. Ozone dedication

Street co-named 'Qadri's Way' for brave teen activist

City Councilman Ruben Wills (D-Jamaica) held a street-renaming ceremony Tuesday to commemorate the life of a teen advocate whose life was cut short by two rare illnesses.

Qadri Skipper fought with pulmonary hypertension and hereditary hemorrhagic telangiectasia for up to 12 years, and alongside his mother advocated for a Department of Education financed, advanced life-support ambulance to transport him to and from school. He died at the age of 17.

Now 110th Street between 107th Avenue and 109th Avenue in South Ozone Park is known as Qadri's Way in honor of his 12-year battle, which ended in 2012.

"The story of Qadri Skipper is one that begs to be told and shared. It illustrates the remarkable courage with which this young man faced the prospect of death at only the age of

5, and persevered well beyond the two-year timeline his doctors estimated," Wills said. "Qadri refused to let these disorders dictate the terms of his life, and he lived as completely as one saddled with such burdens possibly could,."

Skipper was a student at the Information Technology High School in Long Island City, according to Wills, and died during his last year of enrollment. He was posthumously awarded his diploma. There is now an annual scholarship in his name.

"I stand here today, I know where my blessings are," Doreen Blair-Skipper, Qadri's mother said, after explaining her son's contribution to the lives of other people burdened with the two diseases. "And Qadri's Way street signing is a testament of his character."

Joann Schmidt, a pulmonary hypertension support group leader and patient who knew Skipper, spoke at the ceremony and told the story of her experience with the young man who faced these uncomplainingly. burdens Brooke Keith, another PH patient, said if it had not been for Skipper, who encouraged her to be vigilant about taking her medication, she would not be alive today.

Kenneth Pawlukiewicz, the 2013 Information Technology High School PTA president and founder of Qadri Skipper Memorial Scholarship, said he had not met Skipper but was so inspired by the story his mother told him about her son that he organized the annual scholarship in his name.

"From talking sports with his nurses and doctors to supporting others facing difficulty, Qadri never allowed his condition to hold him back. All of us can learn from his example," said Councilman Eric Ulrich (R-Ozone Park), co-sponsor of the event. "This street naming allows us to honor Qadri's memory and remember the joy he brought to

DOE withdraws plan to place charter in IS

Opponents of a controversial proposed co-location between a public middle school and a charter high school in Queens Village celebrated the news this week that the DOE had withdrawn the plan.

The Panel for Educational Policy originally planned to vote on the proposal to operate New Visions Charter High School for the Humanities IV in the facility currently housing Jean Nuzzi Intermediate School, also known as IS 109Q, at 213-10 92nd Ave. last Monday, but the DOE confirmed that the proposed had been withdrawn prior to the meeting.

"After extensive engagement and discussions with educators from both schools, local community members, PEP members and elected officials, we decided to withdraw the proposal at this time," a DOE spokeswoman said. "We continue to work with the Jean Nuzzi school community and other key partners on how to best use the available space to meet the diverse needs of District 29 students and families, and also work closely with New Visions to ensure a smooth

transition into a long-term site."

City Councilman Barry Grodenchik (D-Oakland Gardens), state Sen. Leroy Comrie (D-Hollis) and Queens Borough President Melinda Katz all stood in opposition to the plan, and had expressed their concerns in a letter sent June 17 to the mayor's office and the DOE. Katz and other elected officials released a statement Monday praising the DOE's decision, stating that the city "has not given up on IS 109Q," while a spokesman for New Visions said that the organization did not have a comment on the withdrawn proposal.

Grodenchik expressed appreciation that the DOE had listened to community opposition and said he disagreed with the DOE's original assessment that IS 109Q was being under utilized.

"We didn't believe the school was as empty as the DOE believed," Grodenchik said. "We understand that the enrollment is going up, and it'll be back over 1,000 students in the fall. Some good things are starting there."

IS 109 enrolled about 972 students in its most recent Continued on Page 50

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NY Pops brings Broadway to Forest Hills

AT&T is sponsoring the New York Pops Orchestra's "Kids in the Stadium" concert coming to Forest Hills Stadium July 7.

The Street Charge program, AT&T kiosks which allow concert-goers to power up mobile devices, went live Saturday at the music venue for the first Pops event of the season.

Over 1,000 students from throughout Queens are expected to attend the show, which will feature Matthew Morrison, the Tony- and Emmynominated star of "Glee, "and Megan Hilty, Grammy- and Tony-nominated actress as guest performers as well as the orchestra organizing the event.

"This is a wonderful venue and it's right in their backyard. It's an opportu-

nity to say to these families in Queens, you don't even have to go outside of your borough to be able to experience this world-class entertainment event with Broadway stars and the New York Pops Orchestra," Vettoso said, adding ticket requests exceeded the 1,000 they were hoping for, prompting the orga-

nization to open the event up to 1,500 sponsored attendees.


Requests from Queens schools alone stand at approximately 1,300, specifically from Flushing and Long Island City.

"We think it's important to expose children to all sorts of things, and music and the arts is one of those. We were excited about the opportunity to sponsor the Pops in a way that allowed us to offer free tickets to students and also to our customers. This afforded us an opportunity to support the Queens community and the New York Pops, which is an iconic brand," Marissa Shorenstein, New York state president for AT&T said.

The summer of 2016 will be the second year in a row for the Carnegie Hall-based organization to host events at Forest Hills Stadium, which has allowed them to offer free seating to more students than the Manhattan venue, with spots for about 100, Vettoso said.

In honor of Father's Day, NY Pops and AT&T activated the Street Charge kiosks at Forest Hills Stadium for the first time at a Saturday concert called the Pops for Pop customer appreciation event. This was an outreach program by AT&T, which sponsored 750 people to attend.

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Legislature passes mayoral control

Republican-controlled state Senate holds de Blasio to one-year extension once again

After months of protracted negotiations and uncertainty, the state Legislature voted to extend Mayor Bill de Blasio's control over the New York City public school system for only one year-the same length of time the city was granted the year before.

Senate Majority Leader John Flanagan (R-Smithtown) had pushed for a one-year extension, in contrast with Mayor de Blasio, Democratic lawmakers and Gov. Andrew Cuomo, who wanted the mayor to have a three-year agreement. The Democratic-controlled sembly had originally passed a three-year extension, but state Sen. Jose Peralta (D-East Elmhurst) said Republican lawmakers were resolute that de Blasio only get one year.

"It was kind of a game of chicken who was going to blink first. When it was all said and done, the Republicans didn't budge," he said. "I was always in favor of more than one year. I think you need stability.

The deal, one of several fi-

nalized during a flurry of activity in the closing hours of the legislative session, sets up another struggle between de Blasio, Republican state lawmakers and Cuomo over the

process of mayoral control, which will now unfold in an election year for the mayor.

"While one-year extensions are no way to treat our children, families or educators, this action is a crucial acknowledgement by state lawmakers that the education progress we have made in New York City could not have happened without our accountable control of the school system," de Blasio said.

Legislature first passed mayoral control in 2002 for former Mayor Michael Bloomberg. The decision placed greater accountability for New York's public schools on the mayor. Both de Blasio and Bloomberg contend that schools improved under the

Before mayoral control, autonomous community school districts controlled schools. The Legislature initially granted Bloomberg seven years of control and passed an extension in 2009.

De Blasio advocated for a seven-year extension in 2015 but was only granted one year. This year's deal requires school districts to release information on how they allocate funding and will also allow charter schools to switch authorizers more easily.

De Blasio and Republican legislators had a contentious relationship that was further abraded by de Blasio's support for Democratic upstate can-

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LIC Summit told biz survey finds 87% plan to stay in nabe

The challenges facing residents and businesses in Long Island City were discussed at length during the third annual LIC Summit at the Museum of the Moving Image Tuesday. Several panels brought together business and civic leaders as well as city and state officials, to weigh in on the changing landscape of Long Island City during the day-long event.

"You're in the most exciting neighborhood in New York City," Modern Spaces Founder and CEO Eric Benaim said. "There's more construction happening here in LIC than anywhere else in New York

Benaim was co-hosting the event with Elizabeth Lusskin, the president of the LIC Part-

Crowley clears hurdle to rename Jax Hgts PO

The House of Representatives unanimously passed legislation Tuesday to rename the Jackson Heights Post Office in honor of Jeanne and Jules Manford, the late Flushing residents who fought for the advancement of equal rights for LGBT Americans.

U.S. Rep. Joe Crowley (D-Jackson Heights) sponsored the bill while U.S. Sens. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) and Charles Schumer (D-NY) introduced companion legislation in the Senate earlier this month.

"Last week we faced a terrible and tragic attack on the LGBT community in Orlando," Crowley said on the House floor prior to the vote. "Today, we stand in honor of two individuals who, when

faced with a hateful act of violence themselves, were inspired to start a movement couched in acceptance and support. Jeanne and Jules were instrumental in the fight for equal rights, and their incredible legacy can be felt throughout Queens, New York, and the entire country. It is only fitting that we name the post office that sits along the route of the Queens Pride Parade in their honor."

Jeanne Manford publicly denounced the beating of her gay son, Morty Manford, for protesting news coverage of the LGBT rights movement in 1972.

Later that year, Jeanne and her husband, Jules, founded the Parents' Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, an organization that advocates on behalf of

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Bernie, Obama staff join Jung campaign

S.J. Jung, a community activist challenging state Sen. Toby Stavisky (D-Flushing) for her seat, introduced his campaign staff to the media Tuesday, which includes veterans of the presidential campaigns of U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders (I-Vt.) and U.S. President Barack Obama.

In March, Jung, former president of the MinKwon Center for Community Action, announced he would be running for the second time against Stavisky, whom he first challenged in 2014. Stavisky won about 60 percent of the vote to around 40 percent for Jung.

The 16th Senatorial District includes parts of Flushing, Bayside, Whitestone, Elmhurst, Woodside, Rego Park and Forest Hills.

Jung held a news conference at his campaign office at 32-26 Union St. in downtown Flushing to present his election team.

"Our campaign staff actually consists of a combination of the Queens veterans who have deep roots and live networks in the district and also campaign experts who knows how to organize ground games, who really knows how to organize a winning election," Jung said.

Kyle Sullivan, a veteran of presidential campaigns in many states, who was most recently the regional field director for Bernie Sanders for President 2016 in Las Vegas, is the campaign manager. Bern Barber, a New York veteran of numerous winning Sanders ground operations, is the field director.

Sullivan said Jung has a

long-term vision, has run a private business and has also worked in the private sector, making him the right individual to find solutions "that could bring Queens into the future."

"In the year of the outsider, what we really need to do is listen to the concerns of the people, go door-by-door, talking to voters about what they really care about and trying to figure out how we can find common ground," he said.

Roeme Kim, a former Community Board 7 member and former executive director of the YWCA of Queens, a position she held for 21 years, and David Wong, who has been participating in community service and advocacy for Chinese Americans, Asian Americans and low-income

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and middle-income families in Queens, are also staff members.

The New York firm

political consultants Brown-MillerGroup, whose partner Chris Miller was an early member of Obama's team and helped craft his grassroots strategy, is a general consultant.

Jung, who has billed his campaign as "A New Day in Queens, A New Day for Albany" said he has received a "tremendous response" from voters and neighbors in the district

He said he wants to create good jobs, address income inequality, boost the local economy, pass meaningful ethics and campaign finance reforms to ensure Albany is held accountable and

Primary Day for Dems

Contenders for Queens offices vie to face GOP foes

Queens Democrats will head to the polls Tuesday for primary elections to determine the candidates who will face off against Republican opponents in this November's general election.

Five candidates are competing in the Democratic primary in the 3rd Congressional District to succeed U.S. Rep. Steve Israel (D-Melville), who announced his retirement in January. Attorney Jonathan Clarke, North Hempstead Town Supervisor Jon Kaiman, North Hempstead Town Councilwoman Anna Kaplan, Suffolk County Legislator Steve Stern and former Nassau County Executive Tom Suozzi are all running to face Re-

publican Jack Martins.

The 3rd
District includes parts of
Bay Terrace,
Little Neck,

Glen Oaks, Floral Park and Whitestone as well as sections of Nassau and Suffolk counties in Long Island. During the campaign northeast Queens voters expressed concern about airplane noise from the LaGuardia flight paths and the need for better, affordable transit options to the candi-

dates in the race.

In District 5, which includes parts of Jamaica, South Jamaica, St. Albans, Queens Village and the Rockaways, U.S. Rep. Gregory Meeks (D-Jamaica) is in the midst of a primary challenge from Ali Mirza, a small businessman who is running on a platform decrying corruption in Washington and proclaiming progressive bona fides. The winner will face Republican challenger Michael O'Reilly, an attorney and a 2015 candidate for judge in New York City Civil Court.

U.S. Rep. Nydia Velázquez (D-Brooklyn) will face off against Jeffrey M. Kurzon, who also challenged her in 2014,

and Yungman Lee, a banking executive, in a primary for District 7, which includes parts of Maspeth, Ridgewood, Woodhaven and Ozone Park, as well as areas in Manhattan and Brooklyn. In District 12, which includes parts of Astoria, Long Island City and Woodside, U.S. Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-Astoria) will face challenger Peter Lindner.

Additionally, Reform Party voters in six districts will be able to write in the name of a candidate to be on the ballot in the general election, according to the city Campaign Finance Board site.

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Jamaica congestion addressed at workshop

Community members asked for better options for pedestrians in downtown Jamaica during a public workshop Tuesday sponsored by the city Department of Transportation.

The workshop was held at the Jamaica Center for Art and Learning to gather ideas for the DOT's streetscape plan on how to improve the business district for residents and commuters.

"We are going to prioritize what we look at from hearing from you," Erin Maciel, a DOT landscape architect,

The DOT's study area encompasses Jamaica and Archer avenues up to Hillside Avenue, stretching from Sutphin to Merrick Boulevard, and the streetscape study is one of the actions included in the Jamaica NOW Action

Montgomery Wilkinson, a member of the Jamaica NOW Leadership Council who lives in Locust Manor, said public plazas or small parks for people who live and work in the area would be welcome on Jamaica Avenue.

"They should keep the people in mind, and not just the car traffic," he said, pointing to areas like Times Square or Fulton Street in downtown Brooklyn as places where the city has

mitigated excess congestion. "I think discussing particular main streets in Jamaica can be a model in that ap-

After the presentation, the audience broke into groups dedicated to

the study area. In the Archer Avenue session, participants echoed Wilkinson's concerns. Several people said the area was saturated with buses. More

than 50 city and regional bus lines pass through downtown Jamaica, not including the commuter vans that bring people from outlying residential areas to the downtown corridor.

"You look at the Queens bus map and they don't even have space to list all the lines," Maciel said, while looking at a map of the downtown area draped across a folding table.

Earl Simons, the director of government and community relations at York College, said pedestrians had little room to walk on sidewalks after leaving station stops at Sutphin Boulevard, where the LIRR and JFK AirTrain are located, as well as Jamaica Center. He pointed toward a photo showing a stretch of Archer Avenue where the sidewalk was partially blocked by parked vehicles.

"We're just a few minutes away from the LIRR," he said. "But you walk down Archer from Sutphin and that's what you meet."

After collecting community input, the DOT team will prepare design concepts and return in the fall for another workshop to present their ideas. People can input their ideas at nycdotfeedbackportals.nyc/downtown-jamaica/.

The study is scheduled to conclude in the spring of 2017.



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Simotas rape kit bill wins vote Assembly

On the last day it was in session, the state Assembly passed a bill that would speed up the testing of rape kits and prevent future backlogs. The legislation, sponsored by Assemblywoman Aravella Simotas (D-Astoria), mandates that rape kits are sent to a forensic laboratory for testing within 10 days and that their progress is tracked from police agencies to the lab.

"For the sake of sexual assault victims, who must undergo an immediate, intrusive and arduous exam for evidence collection, we have a duty to make sure rape kits are never neglected," Simotas said. "New York state needs this law if we want to have justice for victims, prosecution and punishment for the guilty and for innocent suspects to be set free."

The state Senate passed a companion bill earlier, according to Simotas. The legislation solves the problem of untested rape kits wherever they may be sitting on shelves.

In 2003. New York City received \$2.5 million from the federal government to test a backlog of 17,000 rape kits. Without the tracking and reporting requirements of the Simotas bill, however, there is no way to prevent future backlogs from developing.

"In 1993, I was violently raped and robbed at gunpoint in New York City. The horror

and trauma of that event is indescribable, but I was fortunate: medical examiners recognized that my body was a crime scene," said Natasha Alexenko, a rape survivor and founder of Natasha's Justice Project,. "All rape victims in New York deserves this justice, and deserve the same minimum standard of care in ensuring their rape kit is tested. Justice matters. It matters to victims like me. It matters to the families of victims. It matters to the wrongfully accused and it matters to the people of New

Meanwhile, the state Senate passed a bill co-sponsored by state Sen. Joseph Addabbo, Jr. (D-Howard Beach), that would require the state Education Department and the state Office of Mental Health to develop materials focusing on suicide prevention and signs of depression among school-aged children and to provide them with educators throughout the state.

There is no question that early intervention and recognition of suicidal behavior is key to preventing these heartbreaking incidents among students," Addabbo said. "We need to keep our eyes wide open, paying close attention to our children both at home and at school and working to better recognize the signs of impending tragedy.'

To underscore the importance of these efforts, Addabbo noted that suicide is the third leading cause of death among young people ages 15 to 24 in the United States.

"In addition, a study released by the National Center for Health Statistics in April showed that the overall U.S. suicide rate has surged to it highest levels in almost 30 years, affecting all age groups," he said. "By teaching our educators to better recognize the signs of potential suicidal tendencies, and by helping our young people understand the gravity of this problem, I hope we will see fewer students giving up on life before they have had a chance to live it."

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SAVING THE CIRCUS

The Big Apple Circus, which has delighted families at Cunningham Park and Lincoln Center for more than 30 years, is on the verge of extinction.

Founded by two American jugglers back in 1977, Big Apple is actually a nonprofit that brings circus arts to children across the country as well as youngsters in 50 pediatric hospitals. Circus performers make "clown rounds" to about 250,000 hospitalized children every year, using humor as a healing tool.

The raising of the Big Top tent in Cunningham Park is a highly anticipated annual event for the borough and provides a roof over 1,700 seats priced to entertain as many children as possible.

The classic one-ring circus has introduced wideeyed youth to thrilling acrobatics, gentle animal acts and amusing clown capers, which satisfy audiences even though there are no tigers, lions or bears. There was a shadow over this year's performance in Fresh Meadows, however. It was no secret that the circus had been struggling in recent years, but the situation has become dire. On the final day of the Queens performances, June 12, co-founders Paul Binder and Michael Christensen appealed for donations to keep the circus alive.

Their goal is to raise \$2 million so that Big Apple can stage its fall production at Lincoln Center in Manhattan, support its community programs and keep more shows in New York City.

The award-winning circus, which had its first tent-raising in Battery Park City in 1977, was hurt by the 2008 recession, the Boston bombing, Superstorm Sandy and an Atlanta ice storm. These events depressed ticket sales and left the nonprofit in a precarious state. Layoffs and pay cuts followed.


Contributions have been coming in at a rapid clip, but \$2 million is only a quick fix.

The Big Apple Circus needs an infusion of serious funds to get back on its feet and to continue its ambitious mission. Three hospitals in New York City-Bronx-Lebanon Hospital Center, Harlem Children's Hospital and Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer count on the nonprofit to visit their young patients.

In fact, the circus, which is headquartered in Brooklyn, helped fund the Harlem Hospital Center back in the 1960s.

It's time for the city to extend a lifeline to the Big Apple Circus, whether through discretionary funds from elected officials, contributions from some wellheeled private citizens or a public interest campaign to save the organization.

Our hometown circus has touched the hearts of people across the city. It would be a shame to let it die without mounting a major rescue effort.

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Albany stalled on safety

We at Transportation Alternatives are outraged that Albany lawmakers have ended the session without taking action on a number of bills related to street safety. We are profoundly dismayed by the lack of leadership and cooperation in both the Assembly and the Senate to address urgent transportation safety issues.

Lawmakers failed to advance the Every School Speed Safety Act, which would have allowed New York City to deploy more cameras in school zones and operate them during after-school hours, when many serious crashes take place.

Assembly members and senators also failed for the second year in a row to take an important step to combat the scourge of hit-and-run—which is particularly galling at a moment when New York City has seen five fatal hit-and-run crashes in eight days. The bills before state lawmakers would have taken the long-overdue tion safety task force, NYS DOT to establish for the transportation network safety cameras on school regulate e-bikes, and drivers to give bicyclis feet of distance when proven the oth passed both chambers.

step of aligning the penalty for injury hit-and-run with the penalty for Driving While Intoxicated. Under current law, drivers who may have consumed alcohol and are then involved in a collision have a perverse incentive to flee, since the penalty for a DWI is now more severe than the penalty for leaving the scene.

Other measures that have not moved for two years in a row would have increased penalties for violations like drugged driving and unlicensed driving. Lawmakers failed to take action on bills to establish a school transportation safety task force, require NYS DOT to establish five- and 20-year plans for the state's transportation network, put safety cameras on school buses, regulate e-bikes, and require drivers to give bicyclists three feet of distance when passing. Though several bills passed one chamber or the other, none

Actually, there was an exception, but its demise is especially frustrating. The bills would have required the DMV to educate license applicants about driving safely in the presence of bicyclists and pedestrians. The legislation passed both chambers but died in committee after the two versions could not be reconciled because one used the word "may" instead of "shall." In this case, it appears that inaction combined with the habit of passing bills in the final week, caused another piece of safety legislation to wither in Albany.

Too many New Yorkers continue to be killed and maimed in preventable crashes. Street safety advocates will be back in Albany in the fall to call on lawmakers to step up and take action on these life-saving measures in the next session.

The online rush to judge grieving parents

here was an outpouring of online sympathy for the parents of the little boy killed by an alligator at a Disney resort in Orlando last week, which just goes to show that sometimes the Internet has a heart, and sometimes it calls for blood.

The question is why.

In contrast with the half a million people who signed a petition against Michelle Gregg, the mom whose 3-yearold son got into the gorilla exhibit at the Cincinnati Zoo, leading zookeepers to kill the 400-pound gorilla named Harambe, commentators did not go nearly as insane over

It was with relief that I found far more comments castigating those who would blame the parents than actual parental castigation. It is like the high road was the cool place to be, this time.

"It's ridiculous to blame the parents who were sitting a few feet away and did all they could to save him," read a typical online comment. And, on Twitter, "Pray for his family. Don't judge."

Compare to: "#GorillaIncident Mom is totally at fault shoot her."

So, what accounts for the vast difference in response to these two incredibly rare toddler-animal tragedies that took place at family-friendly places?

Well first of all, of course.

the fact that officials "put the 2-year-old died. There's no way to say that the Graves family hasn't suffered enough. (And what an eerily sad last name.) Also, even as the story broke, we heard that the father desperately tried to open the alligator's jaws and couldn't. No one could dare accuse that dad of not doing enough.

Then, too, there's the question of racism-although I think many people were jumping on the Cincinnati mom before they knew she was African-American. Graves was

And there's even the question of species-ism: Gorillas look like us. Alligators don't. (At least, not like most of us.)

But even more than all that, I think that so many people were eager to flog the Cincinnati mom because the mob needed someone to blame (that's what mobs do), and moms are a favorite target these days.

This is the era when we

have come to believe that mothers can and must be in control of their kids at all times. Any mom who takes her eyes off her kids—and we hear about it—is automatically a public enemy (Think of all those moms berated for letting their kids wait in the car a few minutes, or play at the park unsupervised). So if anything bad happens to an unsupervised kid, it is the mom's fault.

But with the alligator incident, the mob seems to be aiming not at the mom, but

"I say the Grand Floridian is responsible for not having signs posted about the gators!!' read one typical comment.


The similarity here is that if there is any entity we love to blame more than moms, it's corporate America. So if we truly believe a mom should be been thinking, "Well, I know this has never happened once in 38 years of the gorilla exhibit, but what if today my kid tries to get in-and does? I better be preparing for that!" then we are also quite capable of thinking, "Well, just because we are one of the most popular tourist destinations in the world and not once has a guest ever been killed by an alligator, nonetheless we should be constantly warning vacationers about that gruesome possibility."

In both cases, the crowd has found someone it can secondguess after a once-in-a-generation (or two) tragedy. That way it doesn't have to contemplate the unpredictability of life, or the fact that there is no such thing as perfect safety, or perfect parents. It can simply sit back and blame.

Armchair blaming has become America's favorite coping device.

When an airport landed and the UN took off

uppose you could afford your own plane and might decide to bypass the daily commute? In June 1948 Queens residents were watching with interest preparations for the official opening of the New York International Airport at Idlewild (now known as JFK Airport). On June 28 practice flights and landings began. Capt. Douglas Larsen piloted the first commercial plane to land at the new airport, a Peruvian International Airways DC-4.

Eager to make the news as well as simply recording it, the Star-Journal chartered its own plane in order to set a re-

In conjunction with the cord—landing the first private plane at Idlewild. On June 20, Aviation Editor Roy Carlton gave a full report:

"This is seven-nine-king, Stinson 150, out of Rockaway Airport. Landing instructions, please. 'Hello, Long Island Star-Journal plane, you are cleared to land at runway two-five left. Wind south soutwest, 15 mph.' 'Roger ... coming in.

"Joseph Alta, Rockaway Airport manager and momentarily my co-pilot, chuckled as the Jamaica Bay Sahara they call an airport loomed closer. 'You'd never recognize the place,' he said. "In 1941, it was called Queens County Airport. I used to operate a flying service right there out where those two hangers are. And that 9,500-foot runway is.'

"Guess you could still land a Cub on that spot-right inside that 300-foot tower.' The control tower operator flashed the green light at us. 'Clear the land,' snapped Alta, getting down to business.

"The airport seemed to stretch all over Queens. We turned into the runway. A small one-6,000 feet long. The concrete stretched like a ribbon toward the horizon, and the Stinson looked like a green pea on a billiard table. The plan settled. Wheels screeched as rubber rubbed runway and stuck. Riding out to meet us were a jeep, a sedan, a crash truck and an ambulance. The drivers waved and shouted. 'Follow us.' The procession rolled down three miles of runway, taxi-strips, and apron.

"'What a reception,' Alta remarked. 'First seagulls, now a parade. Either we rate or these crash truck men like to practice.' A flight attendant on the ramp waved his arms. We taxied up, parked in front boat used to sail there, where of the tower, and stepped out.

A tall, slender man stuck out nal, the borough was reluctant his hand and said, 'I'm George McSharry, the superintendent. Welcome to New York International Airport."

Now it was UN delegates such as Dag Hammerskjold, Golda Meir and Eleanor Roosevelt who were coming to our borough. Just the previous year, in 1947, the United Nations had voted to create the state of Israel in the building in Flushing.

to say goodbye to its illustrious resident. "The temporary home of the United Nations in Flushing Meadows Park may yet become its permanent home, the Queens Chamber of Commerce suggested today. Because of the failure of Congress to approve a loan of \$65,000,000 for the development of the UN headquarters in Manhattan, there is a 'grave danger' that the permanent world capital may be established outside the United States, Frank O'Hara said today in a letter to Mayor O'Dwyer. O'Hara proposed that the city offer Flushing Meadows Park as an alternate to the Manhattan site. Today's proposal stressed the convenience of the location and the belief that a permanent headquarters could be erected at substantially lower cost."

But it was not to be. In 1951. the United Nations moved to its present location on 1st Avenue in Manhattan. It is tempting to speculate how the history of Queens might have been

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How a complex man became a great father

have never visited my father's birthplace in Kosice, Czechoslovakia. In fact, I find that part of the world quite confusing. I couldn't tell you the difference between a Czech and a Slav or what area the Czech Republic occupies.

My father, who passed away in 1999, was an incredibly complex man who survived the death camps of the Holocaust and then returned to an Eastern Europe where his family—mother, father, two brothers and a sister-were but a memory. He made a few European pit stops in Vienna and Paris before deciding to raise a family in America.

I often think that his will to live after losing so many close loss is unfathomable, more than anyone should bear in a lifetime, much less at the age of 16 when we in America are mostly worried about college, sex and our future prospects.

He wore his pain stoically. Most people did not know the baggage he carried in his heart. But those close to him saw the immeasurable pain and damage the war had inflicted. He was a man who always thought doom was around the corner, that any silver lining was about to be eclipsed by a dark cloud.

It is Father's Day as I write this and a glance at my Facebook feed shows countless pictures of fathers and pithy tributes. It is hard to sum up a huge relationship—one that has so many layers and ups and downs—in a short tribute. But many try to do this and it makes us feel good that, even though our fathers are gone, we can honor their memory on this Hallmark holiday.

I've been thinking a lot to him is itself a miracle. His about my father lately, more

than 17 years after he suddenly dropped dead while on vacation in Florida. He died at the age of 73, tanned, with his mind still crystal clear and his love for my mother still fierce.

At the time, it all seemed so tragic—an unexpected bursting of an artery, a relatively young man felled just as he was beginning to enjoy being a new grandfather. A big hole opened up in my mother's heart for the loss of her beloved.

I went through the normal stages of grieving. But because my third child was born just three weeks after Dad's sudden death, the focus shifted quickly. My childrelated insomnia was exacerbated by the shock of losing a parent, the first death of someone close to me. My heart ached. I wore his clothing for a few months to feel close. I attended daily prayer groups to say the Jewish prayer for the dead. Life marched on and there were young kids, a newly fragile mother and a growing business to distract me from

thinking too much about my dad and his painful life.

But last month I visited his brother, my only living relative of his generation, and the memories and the aches came flooding back. My uncle regaled me one weekend with stories about how he and my father eluded the Nazis in the mid-1940s, how they were able to procure false Christian identity documents for 9,000 other Jews, and how my father protected his young love-my mother—during the war.

It occurred to me that while my father must have suffered deeply in his teenage years because of the loss of his family, his life after that was filled with much joy. His love affair with my mother, which started when they were both tweens in 1937, stayed strong for the 51 years of marriage they enjoyed. My father saw his two sons grow up in New York, go to prestigious colleges and find success in their chosen professions.

He even got to see the prom-

ised land: two of his grandchildren, Jonah and Tess, were the apple of his eye in those few years he got to enjoy them at the end of his life.

Father's Day does force us to think of our dads and the impact they had on our lives. I was blessed to be raised by a man who was always there when I needed him; I never questioned where he would be when the chips were down. Of course, we all have our quibbles with each of our parents-they should have done this more, they shouldn't have done that, whatever.

But now, as a father of three wonderful children who are each entering their adult years too rapidly for me to ponder, I have a greater appreciation for my father's sturdiness and devotion to family.

In this week after Father's Day, I think of the famous phrase: "Ninety percent of life is just showing up."

Here's to all dads like mine, who never stopped showing up.

That's all we can ask.

Galante paid for officers' dinners: Report

The city Conflicts of Interest Board is weighing penalties against two NYPD assistant chiefs and a retired transportation chief who allegedly ate at fancy restaurants paid for with the business credit card of former embattled Queens Library CEO Thomas Galante, according to a published

The board has found "probable cause" indicating that Assistant Chiefs James Secreto, chief of the NYPD Housing Bureau ,and Diana Pizzuti, commanding officer of Patrol Borough Queens North, as well as former Transportation Bureau Chief James Tuller violated a city charter provision, the Daily News reported Wednesday.

The COIB says that no public servant may accept a valuable gift worth \$50 or more from an individual or firm doing business with the city.

Wayne Hawley, general counsel for the COIB, said the board is not permitted to discuss a case unless the individ-

uals have admitted to or have been found after a trial to have violated the law.

Thomas Rohback, Galante's lawyer, declined to comment as his lawsuit filed against the Queens Library is pending.

"We are in the process of litigating that right now," Roh-

The NYPD officials ate with Galante, who was ousted from his position in December 2014 for allegedly misusing library funds, at restaurants such as Quality Meats, Christo's Steakhouse, San Pietro and Wolfgang's Steakhouse but there appeared to be no allegation that they did any favors for him, the newspaper said.

Pizzuti and Tuller, the former commanding officer of Patrol Borough North, allegedly brought their spouses to the dinners meant for discussions on police matters and could face up to \$25,000 in penalties for each dinner violation, the News said.

Secreto allegedly told investigators from the NYPD Internal Affairs Bureau that when he succeeded Tuller

Sgt. David Villanueva, formerly a supervisor in the NYPD's gun licensing division, was charged with bribery offenses in connection with his receipt of cash bribes to expedite and approve gun licenses, Bharara continued.

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Monserrate makes run for district leader office

Hiram Monserrate is plotting his return to politics. The disgraced former state senator is running for Democratic district leader in the Elmhurst and Corona neighborhoods, a position held by incumbent George Dixon.

"It seems Hiram didn't learn the lesson from his previous attempts running for office," state Sen. Jose Peralta (D-East Elmhurst) said. "The community does not want him back, and they already rejected him twice."

Monserrate's campaign literature touts "a lifetime of service delivering for our community" and lists his time on the City Council, the New York State Senate and his service in the U.S. Marine Corps and the NYPD. The literature makes no mention that he was expelled from the state Senate in 2010 after he was convicted of assaulting his girlfriend Karla Giraldo.

Monserrate shocked the borough's political scene when he slashed Giraldo's face with glass, then pulled her down the stairs and through the hallway of his Jackson Heights apartment building. Giraldo later claimed the slashing, was an accident but he received a misdemeanor assault conviction for pulling her by her hair, which was caught by a security camera.

In 20012, Monserrate was sentenced to 24 months in prison for fraud after

he used City Council funds through a Corona non-profit and (then using the organization) to conduct his failed 2006 state Senate campaign.

Meng secures \$8 million in cancer research funds

An amendment introduced by U.S. Rep. Grace Meng (D-Flushing) securing an additional \$8 million for cancer research was passed last week.

The amendment provides funding for the Defense Department's Peer-Reviewed Cancer Research Program. The congresswoman's amendment was attached to the Department of Defense Appropriations Act of 2017.

The multimillion dollar increase in research funding will be used to combat bladder, brain, colorectal, liver, pancreatic and stomach cancers, as well as lymphoma, melanoma and other skin cancers, mesothelioma, and cancer in children, adolescents and young adults.

"I'm pleased that the House of Representatives unanimously agreed to allocate additional federal dollars to combat diseases that kill millions of Americans every year," Meng said. "Too many lives are lost far too early, and it is my hope that this funding will contribute to finding a cure for these horrific cancers. We all know someone whose life has been touched by a cancer victim or cancer survivor. I hope that one day Americans will not have to know that pain."

Meng's amendment was supported by Action to Cure Kidney Cancer, American Brain Tumor Association, American Urological Association, Asbestos Disease Awareness Organization, Bladder Cancer Action Network,

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

City Council approves free tampons bills

New York City is on the verge of becoming the first in the nation to guarantee free access to feminine hygiene products for tens of thousands of women in public schools, homeless shelters and jails.

The City Council voted its approval of three landmark pieces of legislation Tuesday that were introduced by City Councilwoman Julissa Fererras-Copeland (D-East Elmhurst).

"Menstrual hygiene products are as necessary as toilet paper and should be treated as basic bathroom supplies," Fererras-Copeland "They allow women and girls, whether in school or in the boardroom, to participate fully in their daily activities and avoid health risks. Providing menstrual hygiene products privately, immediately and for free is also about sending a body-positive message by not perpetuating shame and humiliation, and acknowledging that women's bodies, even those of women serving time

in prison, deserve some dignity during their periods."

The law would require the city's 800 public schools serving grades 6 through 12 to make free tampons and pads available to nearly 300,000 students at a cost of nearly \$3.7 million in fiscal 2017 and an additional \$1.9 million each future year. Mayor Bill de Blasio has supported the move and is expected to sign the legislation into law.

"Nearly 30 percent of teens in New York City live in poverty," Councilwomen Laurie Cumbo (D-Brooklyn) and Helen Rosenthal, (D-Manhattan) co-chairs of the Women's Caucus of the City Council,

said. "The cost of feminine hygiene products can be as high as \$100 annually and competes with other basic necessities like toilet paper, food and lodging, particularly for women and families that make daily financial sacrifices to make ends meet."

Fererras-Copeland's menstrual equity initiative began with a free dispenser at the girl's room at Corona's High School for the Arts and Businesses in September. Attendance jumped 2.4 percent as fewer girls asked to be excused from class throughout the day.

"I believe it should be a basic human right -- not to be humiliated by the consequences of not having access to a sanitary pad or tampon," Free the Tampons Founder Nancy Kramer said. "Virtually every woman has a painful story of a time when she did not have access to these items."

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Concert promoters infuriate Fererras-Copeland

Kanye West headlines Citi Field music festival in October but approval process ignored

The promoters of an October music festival at the Citi Field parking lot featuring hip-hopper artist Kanye West is drawing the wrath of City Councilwoman Julissa Fererras-Copeland (D-East Elmhurst) for misrepresenting themselves.

Live Nation and Founders Entertainment are presenting the Meadows Festival Oct. 1-2 and they claimed to be partners with, and have the support of, the Flushing Meadows Corona Park Alliance.

But they did not.

"I believe in bringing cultural events that can spur economic growth to benefit our community," Fererras-Copeland said. "I met with Founders Entertainment to hear their proposals and tell them they must engage more stakeholders to build support for the festival. I was troubled to see them then claim the Flushing Meadows Corona Park Al-

liance as a partner when the alliance is not a partner and was never consulted about this event."

Dan Wempa, New York Hall of Science vice president, is blasting the promoters for scheduling the Meadow Festival on the same weekend as World Maker Faire, which uses the Citi Field lots for overflow parking. The promoters have not filed a traffic plan and have no police approval.

"It is astounding that Live Nation and Founders Entertainment are proceeding with their plans for a concert festival on the same weekend as World Makers Faire, a longestablished annual event in Flushing Meadows Corona Park that draws upwards of 100,000 visitors," Wemba said. "Worse, they are proceeding with a complete lack of transparency or community engage-

ment about how they intend to assure that their event doesn't negatively impact the park.

He added, "By bringing another 30,000 to 50,000 people per day into the neighborhood, this poorly planned mega-concert will undermine what we have done over the past seven years to address community concerns about traffic, safety, and parking. It also threatens to undo a lot of cooperation and engagement that has contributed to the success of the World Maker Faire."

Neither promoter could be reached for comment.

"There are serious concerns about the impact of a music festival on our community, including how this would impact Maker Faire, an existing and popular event in the same park on the same days," Ferreras-Copeland said. "Founders must engage around issues like traffic, safety and economic impact before it earns our community's support."



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


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No show workers slow Second Avenue subway

Despite an accelerated construction schedule to complete the Second Avenue subway's first phase by December the 86th Street station of the massive project was deserted this past Saturday, according to a top MTA official.

Michael Horodniceanu, chief of major projects of the MTA, told a transit agency committee Monday that he visited the 86th Street site at Second Avenue Saturday.

"It was obvious that they had no one on the job," the MTA official said.

He said the Schiavone Construction Co. had around 60 workers on the job at the 96th Street station project Saturday

"It now becomes my job to talk directly with the contractor to see why they did not have the appropriate personnel," said Horodniceanu.

He said "staffing problems" were an "almost daily" occurrence at work sites of the new subway line.

The new line, running between 96th Street and 63rd Street, will carry an estimated 200,000 passengers and take pressure off the 4, 5 and 6 trains on the Lexington Avenue line. The MTA estimates that the Second Avenue subway will reduce crowding by 13 percent on the Lexington line, which transports 40 percent of the city's straphangers every day.

Streets in Jamaica, Kew Gardens and Kew Gardens Hills have received new trash cans, thanks to a new clean-up initiative from Councilman Rory Lancman (D-Hillcrest) and the city Department of Sanitation.

Akhter Hussain, general secretary for the Jamaica Muslim Center at 85-37 168th St., commended Lancman and the Sanitation Department for kick-starting the initiative.

"Jamaica Muslim Center is proud to be partners with them. I would like to do anything they want us to do to facilitate, to help this community," Hussain said.

Rezaul Chowdhury, owner of two area businesses, including the Apnar Pizza store, said he was happy to see a solution to the rampant garbage problem throughout the corridor.

"I'm so happy because it was too much headache for me—every day there was a lot of garbage over here," Chowdhury said.

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City pledges millions to improve college access

Department of Education says 100 schools will get new training to enhance opportunity

The city Department of Education has selected 100 high schools, including 15 in Queens, for a program that will enhance college access and opportunities for their students.

The program, College Access for All, will utilize \$6.8 million during the 2016-17 school year to train staff in the selected schools on how to build a culture of college access. Every high-school junior in those schools will be able take the SAT for free on April 5, 2017.

"When we talk about equity and excellence in our schools, there's nothing more important than making college and careers available to every student, regardless of what neighborhood they live in or their background," Mayor Bill de Blasio said about the new program.

The selected schools were chosen based on low post-

secondary enrollment rates, ty in Far Rockaway. indicating a need to improve college access procedures. The allocated funds will pay for a five-day training session for teams from each school to develop plans on how to improve college and career culture, as well as hiring 11 college planning coaches who will each support about 10 schools.

More than \$3.5 million will be used for school-specific expenditures, including partnerships with college and career access organizations as well as college trips. The DOE also wants every middle school student in the city to have the opportunity to visit a college by 2018.

The selected Queens schools span the borough, from William Cullen Bryant High School in Long Island City to the High School for Law Enforcement and Public Safety in Jamaica and the Queens High School for Law Enforcement for Public Safe-

The DOE intends to offer every high school student in the system an individualized college and career plan by the 2018-19 school year, and contends that every high school in the city will have the College Access for All program in their facilities by that time.

"As the first person in my family to go to college, I understand the importance of creating a schoolwide college-going culture and giving students individualized support to get to college," Schools Chancellor Carmen Fariña said. "This expansion is an exciting opportunity for the 100 selected schools, and I'm looking forward to seeing this initiative reach all our high schools."

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DROWSY DRIVING CAN BE AS DANGEROUS AS DRIVING IMPAIRED

The public is well educated about the dangers of driving while impaired by medication, alcohol or illegal drugs. But drivers may not be aware that driving while tired can be just as dangerous.

Driving when tired can be a fatal mistake. Just as alcohol or drugs can slow down reaction time, impair judgment and increase the risk of accident, so, too, can being tired behind the wheel. Drowsy driving is reportedly what caused the fatal crash in June 2014 between a limousine and a Walmart truck that ended the life of comic

James McNair and seriously injured fellow comedian Tracy Morgan. The driver, Kevin Roper, was going 20 miles over the speed limit and was almost at his drive time limit, according to preliminary reports by the National Transportation Safety Board.

According to the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, about 100,000 car crashes in the United States each year occur as the result of an overly tired driver. Various studies demonstrate that drivers who have remained awake for 18 hours prior to driving

mimic the driving performance of intoxicated motorists. In fact, drowsy driving can be confused with driving with a high blood alcohol content.

Sleepiness can arise relatively quickly, and according to Thomas Balkin, PhD, director of the behavioral biology program at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research and a leading expert on sleep and fatigue, it's difficult for drivers to assess just how sleepy they are.

"Sleepiness affects the part of the brain responsible for judgment and self-awareness," he says. "When you've reached the stage where you are fighting sleep, the effect of any method of reviving yourself can be very short-lived."

Furthermore, people do not have to be in a deep sleep to actually be asleep behind the wheel. Micro-sleeps occur when certain brain cells temporarily shut down for a few seconds. A person is not completely asleep but in a sort of fog as if they are asleep.

When sleepiness sets in, the best course of action is to pull off the road. Opening the window, turning on the radio or blasting cold air is, at best, only a temporary solution. If driving with passengers and feelings of sleepiness appear, hand the keys over to a passenger and have them take over driving, if possible. Otherwise, a short nap and a cup of coffee can be used in combination to increase alertness.

It's also a good idea to avoid beginning a long road trip in mid-afternoon around the hours of two or three o'clock. While alertness generally dips in the evening hours, due to the circadian rhythm, alertness also dips in the late after-

noon, prompting drowsiness. A 2010 study by the American Automobile Association Foundation for Traffic Safety found that as many drivers reported falling asleep at the wheel in the afternoon hours as reported falling asleep late at night. Driving in a warm, quiet car also may spur drowsiness, as would driving after a heavy meal.

Driving tired is just as dangerous as other impaired driving. Slow reaction times and unawareness of surroundings can contribute to accidents that are otherwise avoidable..

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Korean drama troupes offer cultural exchange

Three plays bring combination of traditional and modern styles to LIC's Secret Theatre

BY KEVIN ZIMMERMAN

For the inaugural Korean Theatre Festival in New York 10 years ago, founder Du-Yee Chang performed an original one-man show based on one of Franz Kafka's novels.

Next week Chang, along with 16 other performers from various Seoul theater companies, descend on The Secret Theatre in Long Island City to stage three plays as part of the fourth edition of the festival dedicated to Korean theater.

Chang sees the event as a sort of cultural exchange to introduce American audiences to traditional Korean theater.

"It is very similar to Japanese and Chinese theater forms," Chang said. "There is dance movement and also singing. The stories are sometimes symbolic and usually based on traditional lore."

Korean drama did not go through the realism period which emphasized everyday situations, ordinary speech the late 19th century.

That is not to say that Koreinvented Western theater in rean theater is all mysticism and allegorical stories.

Just as Chang created an adaptation of Kafka's work, other Korean theater compa-

nies perform Western works, but with a decidedly Seoulcentric point of view.

"When we do a Shakespeare play, we are not doing it in an Elizabethan style,' Chang said. "We transform it so Korean audiences can feel familiar with it. It is sort of like how in America, 'Romeo & Juliet' became 'West Side Story."

No large-scale musicals are on tap for this year's festival, but Chang said the three plays scheduled show the variety of what is happening in Korean

"Counselor," written and directed by Hyun Suk Cha, revolves around the owner of a coffee shop, who offers advice to emotionally and mentally wounded patrons, but who has no memory of his own past.

"This is a very modern Korean play," Chang said. "It is really an interesting psychological drama — like a Harold Pinter play."



Brunch held Saturday at the Riverview Restaurant in Long Island City. Hundreds turned out, a larger crowd than usual, according to his office.

"I believe the response to that horrible, horrible act is what we are all doing today," Van Bramer said. "which is live in their memory to live louder, to live prouder, to be stronger.'

After a rousing standing ovation, Van Bramer spoke of the early years of his relationship, when Dan wanted to hold hands or kiss in public.

"I'm not afraid to say I was a little afraid to do that," he said. "But after all of what happened in Orlando it reminds me that all of us should commit to showing our love and even more public displays of affection in their memory. No act of violence can or ever should change who we are and how we should live. Instead it should provoke us to live even prouder and to fight even harder for equality for every single person in the country.'

Vigils and marches have been a nightly occurrence in Jackson Heights where an evening of Rights and Reflections was scheduled to take place Saturday. Leading community

activists and artists will share their experiences with racial and religious discrimination throughout the world beginning at 4 p.m. at Diversity Plaza.

Last Saturday, dozens gathered for a vigil on the Great Lawn in Astoria Park. City Councilman Costa Constantinides (D-Astoria) remembered the victims and stood in solidarity with the LGBT community.

"This heinous crime shows that our Congress must enact gun violence prevention legislation on a federal level," he said. "Gun safety legislation is a common sense solution that would help prevent many of the hundreds of shootings and gun deaths that happen every day throughout the nation."

U.S. Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-Astoria) said much the same thing during a rally on the steps of City Hall last Friday with elected officials, LGBT leaders and gun safety advocates calling on Congress to past gun safety reforms.

"Gun violence is an epidemic in our country," Maloney said. "We just had the deadliest mass shooting in American history in Orlando when a man full of hate murdered 49 people because of their sexual orientation. That was on top of another 6,000 people who have been murdered by guns this

year. This country needs to wake up and pass meaningful gun safety reforms like renewing the assault weapons ban and keeping guns out of the hands of people on the terrorist watch list or those convicted of hate crimes."

On Monday, the Senate rejected four proposals to strengthen the nation's gun laws.

The same day the U.S. Supreme Court refused to strike down gun control laws in New York and Connecticut, which were enacted after 20 children and six educators were killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut. Mayor Bill de Blasio applauded the justices; action.

"From Orlando to San Bernadino to Newtown, far too many Americans have seen their families and communities ripped apart by gun violence," de Blasio said. "Assault weapons and high-capacity magazines have no place on our streets. They are weapons of war that until Congress acts will continue to kill and injure innocent men, women and children."

The annual Gay Pride March will take place Sunday in Manhattan.

the LBGT community as well as their families and friends. The couple opened their Flushing home, at 171st Street off 35th Avenue, to gay New Yorkers who were outcasts in their own homes.

They became pioneers in the American gay rights movement and today, PFLG has more than 350 chapters and over 200,000 members in all 50 states.

"Jeanne and Jules showed how love and passion can move us to make a positive change in our community," Gillibrand said. "Their advocacy is deeply ingrained in the LGBT community here in New York and around the country — beginning with their unmatched love for their son, to the Queens Pride Pa-

rade that marches every year on 37th Avenue, to their founding of an organization that for the last 44 years has fought for LGBT equality. This designation would be a fitting tribute to honor their courage in their decades-long fight for the LGBT community.'

After her death in 2013, President Obama posthumously awarded Jeanne Manford the Presidential Citizens Medal, one of the highest honors an American civilian can receive, for her advocacy work. Jules Manford died in 1982.

Morty Manford was a founding member of the Gay Activists Alliance, which he was heavily involved with until he died from AIDS in 1992.

"Jeanne and Jules Manford were not only loving, accepting parents to their openlygay son, Morty, but they also served as loving, accepting parents to the entire LGBT community," Schumer said.

"It is a truly fitting tribute to the Manford's legacy of work."

Jeanne Manford was the original grand marshal of the Queens Pride, which passes in front of the Jackson Heights Post Office, located at 78-02 37th Ave.

City Councilman Daniel Dromm (D-Jackson Heights), who founded the march and festival, applauded the House

"Jeanne and Jules Manford were the 'parents' of the gay rights movement. They allowed their home to be used as the cradle for gay liberation and were the first parents of an openly gay child to support that child in public," Dromm said. "Jeanne and Jules blazed new trails for the LGBT community by standing up for their openly gay son Morty Manford. This renaming is a fitting tribute to the Manfords and all they believed."

Continued from Page 5 the state law on the FAR, the floor area ratio, to allow for larger structures it claims is necessary to move the affordable housing plan forward.

"Any more changes to allow for even larger buildings is unnecessary and would be unconscionable," Nolan said.

The end of the session at 5 a.m. Saturday was a disappointment for fellow Assemblywoman Margaret Markey (D-Maspeth), a champion of the Child Victims Act for the last decade. That bill would have eliminated the statute of limitations for child sex abuse crimes but never made it to the floor for a vote.

"It was disappointing that, despite the best efforts of my colleagues in the Assembly and our leadership to put forward a very modest compromise bill that could become law this year, there was absolutely no way to move the staunch opposition of the Republican-controlled Senate and get any action on the issue," Markey said. "So much for compromise to help protect children this year. I think we can look for disappointed survivors and supporters to hold them responsible at the ballot box this fall and a very different result when we bring a much stronger bill to the Legislature next January."

The frenzied conclusion to the session garnered mixed reviews for the results and the process itself.

For instance, state Sen. Joseph Addabbo, Jr. (D-Howard Beach) was pleased that action was taken to combat the heroin epidemic that affects many young people in his district, but none was taken to replace the 421-a tax abatement for developers, leaving the building of affordable housing stalled.

"It always seems to happen in the New York State Legislature that the last hours of a six-month legislative session were marked by the appear-

ance of 'The Big Ugly,' which can best be described as the kitchen sink of state government, with a wide variety of unrelated issues all thrown into one big piece of legislation and then served up on a platter for approval," Addabbo said. "I still think this is a terrible way to do the public's business, making and passing deals in the middle of the night, when important issues could have and should have been openly and honestly debated in the light of day over the last six months."

State Sen. Toby Ann Stavisky (D-Flushing) has seen it all since she first got elected to the Senate in 1999.

"It could have been a lot worse," she said. "But I was not pleased that we didn't do enough ethics reform, although we did take the first step with pension forfeiture ,and I don't know how the Republicans couldn't advance the Child Victims Act. That's outrageous."

State Sen. Jose Peralta (D-East Elmhurst) called the session frustrating because Republican senators were regularly blocking important advances in basic matters, particularly the Dream Act, which would authorize conditional residence for undocumented immigrants. State Sen. Michael Gianaris (D-Astoria) agreed.

"Thanks to Senate Democrats, this year's session achieved positive steps on raising the minimum wage, implementing paid family leave, addressing the heroin crisis and funding our public schools," Gianaris said. "Unfortunately, however, despite the scandals rocking state government, the voices of New Yorkers demanding reform were ignored and needed ethics laws were not enacted. We need to end the Albany status quo and restore people's faith in their government."

tioners bemoaning the preponderance of trucks illegally parking or operating in a reckless manner in the confines of the 105th Precinct, which runs along the Nassau border from Glen Oaks to Rosedale.

De Blasio touted a 10 percent drop in murders citywide, with a 20 percent uptick in gun arrests, and contrasted his vision with that of previous administrations and critics. He noted that there were zero murders to date in the confines of the 100th and 105th Precincts, and that community policing was in place in three out of the four police precincts in the area and would be instituted at the 103rd Precinct, which covers Jamaica, this fall.

"I said we need a safer city and a fairer city," he said. "And there were many people saying you had to have one or the other."

The mayor and Richards also spoke about a \$1.5 billion investment from the city included in the mayor's 2015 executive budget to address flooding issues in southeast Queens, with more than \$770 million to be allocated in the next four years. Chief among the issues is to improve sewer infrastructure in the area.

De Blasio also announced that one to three family homeowners would be receiving a \$183 credit from city government this summer in return for what he said was a longstanding practice of hidden taxes in residents' water utility bills, though earlier this

week a Manhattan Supreme Court judge issued a temporary restraining order, saying the city did not have the power to offer the credit.

Last month, the Council passed the legislation decriminalizing low-level, nonviolent offenses.

address summons in this city has been done shoulder-toshoulder with the NYPD," he said. "We want officers to have the opportunity to use the tool they know is right."

Richards also spoke about the new legislation, saying that people of color were overwhelming penalized and burdened by being charged with minor offenses, and said that a prior arrest for a petty crime should not define an individual's future.

"We are leveling the playing field," he said. "Based on the color of our skin, it shouldn't be a life sentence.'

er said that one of his friends suggested they play a version of the knockout game, which is an attempt to knock an individual unconscious with a single punch, police said. The three assailants subsequently approached Khan and began punching him on his face and head, knocking him off his bike in the process, according to the NYPD.

The assailants fled the scene eastbound on Jamaica Avenue towards Francis Lewis Boulevard, according to the police. A statement from the New York Chapter of the Council on American-Islamic Relations released after the attack said the assailants had not stolen Khan's wallet, watch or bike and noted that the three attackers were laughing as they fled.

After the attack, Khan was taken to Jamaica Hospital with lacerations, bruis-

ing and swelling to his face. He suffered from broken ribs and was initially unable to speak to authorities due to the extent of his injuries. Khan had surgery and was unable to open his eyes but was beginning to recover, according to a Facebook post on CAIR-NY's page June 9.

The council called on the NYPD to investigate the assault for a bias motivation. Police subsequently said they were investigating the attack on Khan as a hate crime and were looking for a possible bias motivation.

Police released video showing two of the alleged assailants in the immediate aftermath of the attack outside of 105-13 Jamaica Ave. The three suspects, including the arrested individuals were described as black males in their teens, according to police. The NYPD is encouraging anyone with additional information to call NYPD Crime Stoppers at 1 (800)-577-



Adams lacrosse ace caps HS career with PSAL trophy

Joanna Muniz had waited her whole life for this moment.

Or at least the last four years.

The John Adams senior had a goal. She wanted to win a Wingate Award. Of course, she also wanted to lead her team to victories, to compete for titles and score as many goals as possible, but in the end, it was about getting a Wingate.

Barongi followed up on his pre-game expectations, hauling down Long Island quarterback Mike Catanese and forcing an incomplete pass with just seconds left on the clock.

Now that his high school football career is in the rearview mirror, Barongi has his sights set on Jireh Preparatory Academy in North Carolina, where he's hoping another year of exposure will help attract some big-time college offers.

It might all be over, but Barongi has loved his time on the high school gridiron and, in the end, he simply hopes he did his borough proud.

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Glendale volleyballer aims for Olympics

Playing on the Stadium Court at the AVP NYC Open in Hudson River Park this weekend, Mark Burik looked at home on the sand among the rest of the beach volleyball Olympic hopefuls. The Glendale native had plenty of reasons to feel comfortable displaying his skills in front of the home crowd, which included the members of his family.

"I love it. It lets me breathe," Burik said. "My family is everything to me, so when I come back, it's so nice for me to hang with my brothers after the matches.'

While Burik showed prowess on both sides of the ball, fans would be surprised to know that the 2003 St. Francis Prep graduate played primarily football and baseball in high school, taking only his junior year to test the waters in volleyball.

"At the time it was a big stressful, drastic decision," he said. "I was a high school kid and a teacher [Kevin Colucci] who believed in me built me up and asked me if I wanted to try something new."

Burik walked away from

the game after his junior year and attended the University of Delaware to play college football. A chance meeting with some of the club volleyball players at college encouraged him to give the sport another

After his sophomore year, he sent out videos to a multitude of schools, hoping to land an opportunity to play Division I volleyball. His attempts to garner attention didn't come to much until he finally got the one opening he needed.

"Eventually Fred Chao at George Mason said, 'You could come try out, but it's going to be very difficult," Burik said. "I spent two months trying out and he said, 'We can't cut you, so we're going to keep you for a year.' The rest is history."

His success at George Mason, which included two Second-Team EIVA All-East honors, led to a professional indoor career in Croatia, Norway, and Sweden. But after suffering repeated injuries, he turned his attention to playing beach vollevball full time.

"I was treating (beach) as my way to stay in shape for indoor, he said. "Eventually it took a toll on my body. I had

five cortisone shots in two years and it became too much. So I said, 'If there's one way I could make it to the Olympics and that I could possibly be competitive, it's going to be through beach, so let's go full

Burik's choice to move to California in order to compete at the highest level proved

Along with his partner and college teammate Hudson Bates, he posted a ninth-place finish at the AVP New York City Open and he's looking forward to the opportunity of winning a tour championship in the future.

He'd also like to see the sport continue to grow in New York City so that others in the area can follow in his footsteps. If more young players can have access to more beach courts in the area and the requisite coaching, he feels the talent in the area has the opportunity to expand quickly.

"It needs to be bigger," he said. "I know there are leagues here in the city, but it's tough because there are like eight million people in the city and you have a total of like ten
